III. Overview of Inter-Agency Opioid Coordination Plan

Overarching Goal

- Improve opioid-related morbidity and mortality

Supporting Goals

- Improve Statewide Infrastructure for Opioid Initiatives
 - Streamline interagency and interdepartmental data sharing
 - Improve strategic partnerships at the state, local & community levels
 - Support interdisciplinary partnerships
- Promote Youth Resiliency
 - Address adverse childhood experiences & community trauma
 - Analyze data from the youth risk behavior survey

- Increase Awareness of Substance Use Disorder
 - Address stigma surrounding substance use
 - Raise awareness of public health approaches to address crisis
 - Create accurate and data driven messaging for general public
- Expand Harm Reduction Services
 - Targeted Naloxone distribution
 - Targeted community outreach
- Promote Comprehensive Care Coordination
 - Expansion of mobile health clinics
 - Improve long-term case management
- Expand Maryland's Crisis Response System
 - Identify and fill gaps in crisis services
 - Improve operational efficacy of the current crisis response system
- Expand Access to Evidence Based Treatment for Opioid Use Disorder
 - Promote buprenorphine usage in emergency departments
 - Improve primary care provider engagement
 - Expand medication to all Maryland correctional facilities
- Support Recovery Communities
 - Incorporate recovery specialists in community settings
 - Bolster recovering community infrastructure
 - Promote access to recovery housing and permanent supportive housing

V. ORF Year One Funding Breakdown

Presented by Teresa Heath, OCCC Deputy Director

- State Allocation 15%
 - Awarded at the discretion of the State
 - State agencies
 - State projects
 - Other entities
- State Discretionary Abatement Fund 15%
 - Distributed through competitive grant program
- Targeted Abatement Grants 45%
 - Predetermined amount distributed non-competitively to local jurisdictions
- Local Allocation to Subdivision 25%

Note: Baltimore City government and Baltimore City public schools are not eligible for ORF funding due to ongoing litigation. Other city organizations are eligible.

Q: (from Delegate Rosenberg) How much money from the initial settlement is in the fund? When should a budget request of proposed use be submitted?

A: As of January 9th, none of the year one payments have been deposited into the OCCC's account. Our staff will coordinate with the MDH budget office, and the council will consider having a presentation regarding the budget process as it relates to the ORF.

Q: (from Kristin Thomas) Are there any efforts to make allotted funds transparent to the public?

A: Certainly intend to be transparent: a report will be compiled.

Q: When should municipalities expect to start receiving allocated funds?

A: Funding distribution to government entities has already started; allocation is at the discretion of the subdivision.

Q: Is harm reduction eligible for funding?

A: ORF funding shouldn't be used to take away from existing appropriated funding but added to it.

VI. Recommendations by Council

- Increase Awareness of Substance Use Disorder
 - Active engagement to avoid re-stigmatization
 - Alternatives that are engaging rather than passive
- Promote Comprehensive Care Coordination
- Expand Access to Evidence Based Treatment for Opioid Use Disorder
 - Supporting transportation of consumers' initial entrance into treatment (30 days, 60 days?)
- Support Recovery Communities

VII. Funding Allowances

- The fund may be used only to provide funds for:
 - Improving access to medications proven to prevent or reverse an overdose
 - Supporting peer support specialists and screening, brief intervention, and referral to treatment services for hospitals, correctional facilities, and other high risk populations
 - Increasing access to medications that support recovery from substance use disorders

- Expanding the Heroin Coordinator Program, including for administrative expenses
- Expanding access to crisis bed and residential treatment services
- Expanding and establishing safe stations, mobile crisis response systems, and crisis stabilization centers
- Supporting the health crisis hotline
- Organizing primary and secondary school education campaigns to prevent opioid use, including administrative expenses
- Enforcing the laws regarding opioid prescriptions and sales, including for administrative expenses
- Research regarding and training for substance use treatment and overdose prevention, including administrative expenses
- Supporting and expanding other evidence-based interventions for overdose prevention and substance use treatment
